Manna and Mercy Mondays

January 16 - February 27 12:00-1:00 p.m.

Ever since Alan Storey preached at St. John's in October (you can find the <u>sermon on our website</u>) and led a *Manna and Mercy* retreat, we have been hearing from many people about how powerful it was and the impact he made on them. Those who attended the retreat have been wondering, "What's next? When can we dig deeper into *Manna and Mercy*, and what Alan taught us?"

To help congregations dig into the themes and lessons of *Manna and Mercy*, Alan Storey has created over 40 short video clips that give new insight on how to read scripture, think about a particular Bible story, or how to think about God. They feel like a video daily devotional of sorts.

With that in mind, Pastor Pam and I are excited to introduce *Manna* and *Mercy Mondays* coming in January! Beginning on Monday, January 16, we invite you to bring a lunch and join us over the lunch hour to watch a video or two (each one is about 7-10 minutes long) and have group discussion around the topic. We will meet for 7 weeks, until the beginning of Lent.

The beauty of this time is that each video stands on its own and there is no experience necessary for each week – just show up on the days that you can make it. You do not need to have attended the *Manna and Mercy* retreat in order to participate. If you did attend the retreat, however, you will still learn a lot, as you will get to discuss many of the ideas introduced at the retreat, as well as some new concepts.

Here are some examples of video topics:

In Love, By Love, For Love: The Biblical creation is meant to stand in contrast to another well-known creation story – the Babylonian Creation. Humans in the Babylonian story are born in violence, by violence, and for violence. But the Biblical story is creation is good; the deepest truth about our humanity is we are born in love, by love, and for love.

<u>Truth is Larger than Fact</u>: Some spiritual leaders of old would say, "I don't know if it happened this way but I know it's true." In wrestling with the story of Adam and Eve, Alan considers the difference between saying a Bible story is true versus saying that it is factual.

<u>Is Jesus the Only Way?</u>: What does Jesus mean in John 14:6 when he says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life..."? Many have used this passage in a way that brings heartache to those who struggle to believe in Jesus or who have a loved one who does. Was that Jesus' purpose here? Alan introduces us to the context of this well-known scripture text and suggests that these words from Jesus are meant to comfort the fearful, not condemn the uncertain.

These are just a few of the many topics we can discuss during this time together. We hope you will join us! This is a great way to both grow in faith and in relationship with each other.

Claim a Happy New Year

When January arrives we feel as though we are given a fresh start and we take on the new year with optimistic resolutions. We declare a new year despite the remains of the old year:

usually a mix of sweet memories and weighty baggage. How do you anticipate turning the page from 2016 to 2017? Are you regretting the old and eager to move on to the new? Do you smile with delight as you recall the relationships and events of 2016 and



anxiously cringe as you face possible changes and losses ahead in 2017? Very likely your January days (and nights) contain all of the above, and that is normal.

However, if you sense that regrets and losses are dominating your new year's outlook, consider sharing your concerns with a Stephen Minister. Stephen Ministers are trained to listen to and walk with individuals who need the steadying hand of a faithful friend. Each caring relationship is designed to meet the unique needs of a care receiver. The relationship may be brief with a handful of hour-long conversations or continue with weekly meetings over several years. Long or short, time with a Stephen Minister can move you forward with clarity and hope for the future. Think of a Stephen Ministry connection as you might the January arrival of a garden catalog that helps you imagine the coming of spring!

St. John's Forum: Welcoming the Stranger Understanding Immigration & Sanctuary Sunday, January 8


Many of us have been hearing in the news recently about "Sanctuary Cities" and "Sanctuary Churches" as ways of caring for undocumented immigrants in the United States. Our own Northfield City Council is having this conversation. Join us on January 8 at the St. John's Forum where Alexa Horwart, from the ISAIAH organization, will speak to us about immigration and what it means to be a sanctuary. The forum will include the following:

- Sharing stories from immigrants and connecting them to our own stories
- Dispelling myths and learning about how our immigration system works
- Connecting to what our faith says about immigration
- And how to take action to support our neighbors

Did God Kill Jesus? - A Lenten Book Read on *Making Sense of the Cross,* by David Lose

The title of this article may sound a little harsh, but it is a question worth asking. What happened on the cross and the day Jesus died? What did God accomplish through the cross? Did God kill Jesus? Did

lesus have to die?



While many of us know the importance of the cross and resurrection of Christ to the Christian faith, many of us struggle to articulate why it matters or what it means.

In his book Making Sense of the Cross, David Lose shows that the meaning of the cross has changed over the course of Christian history. To begin, Lose offers a thoughtful review of the four Gospels and how each portrays Jesus' death on the cross and what it might mean. He also walks the reader through three

major ways that the cross has been understood over the past two thousand years, as long with the benefits and drawbacks of each. In the end, Lose hopes to offer an alternative view of the cross that is both biblical and faithful to the Christian life, which then can inform the way we live out the Christian faith in our daily lives.

Beginning on Sunday, February 27, small groups will meet to discuss *Making Sense of the Cross* for one hour a week, over a period of four weeks during Lent. A Conversation on Racism - A 2 Part Adult Forum

Over a year ago, we started a conversation on race using the ELCA's webcast on racism. A lot has happened since then. Philando Castile



was killed during a traffic stop in St. Paul, leading to a long protest outside the Governor's Mansion. Five police officers were killed in Dallas during a protest. Proclamations of "Black lives matter!" have been contrasted with "All lives matter!" Many in the black community have called for the white community to wake up to the systemic racism that is still alive in our country.

On January 22 and 29, Pastors Pam and Jonathan will continue this conversation on racism, and the many topics around it, such as white privilege, colorblindness, and institutional racism. Join us for these hard but important conversations.


Children's Communion Instruction Available

When is my child ready to take Holy Communion? When is anyone really ready? As Lutherans we believe that the sacraments are gifts of God not dependent on our understanding or preparation to be effective as gifts of grace. At St. John's we urge parents to bring their children to the table every week, whether they receive a blessing or the bread and wine. Parents may use discretion based on their own piety and family situation as to when a child receives the bread and wine, but there is no minimum age. Age appropriate materials are available for discussing communion with your child from age 4 and up. Your Radio Ministry Connects Our Community - Now also on FM 95.1

"Faith comes by hearing." That is Scriptural. Though this verse might be a too simplistic description of the way that the Holy Spirit gets into our lives and changes our hearts and minds, it does remind us that hearing the word in a human voice, sung and spoken, has a power that addresses us in a way that reading silently does not. At St. John's, we hear over and over again how important our radio broadcasts on KYMN are for those who cannot be here on Sunday mornings.

- A mother-to-be, suffering from horrible nausea, cannot get out to be in worship in person but gratefully turns on the broadcast to hear our worship services.
- A friend of the congregation, several states away, tunes in online, especially to hear the unique music ministry of St. John's before going to her own local congregation.
- A community member who usually finds himself on the road to the Cities on Sunday mornings listens in on his car radio.
- Members who spend part of their year in warmer places tune in via KYMN's website to keep in touch with St. John's worship.
- A group of St. Olaf students gather in a dorm room on Sunday mornings to hear our 8:30 a.m. service before they head off to participate in worship in other places.
- And of course, many of our own longtime attenders who are now struggling with health issues find this ministry a vital link to their community of faith.

All of these are not imagined scenarios but real stories told to us as staff over the course of the year.

Our radio broadcasts, however, don't just "happen." Our marvelous A/V team, headed by Mark Gleason and Dave Zdenek, keep us technologically functioning along with the staff of KYMN. Our radio announcers, headed by Andy Langehough, show up every week to send a greeting during offering time to those who listen in. And many of you sponsor broadcasts, week after week, so that people you may never meet can hear the Gospel.

KYMN recently began broadcasting on FM at 95.1. The station provided the new equipment necessary to switch over our signal to them. We are grateful to Jeff Johnson and his engineers in making this transition smooth. 



ourselves – and our elected officials – what is best for our neighbors, what enhances the lives of our neighbors.


