

Dear Friends in Christ:

Last week your Church Council, after more than a year of discerning conversations, decided it was time for St. John's to become a Reconciling in Christ congregation, and to adopt the Welcome Statement that was developed over the course of the past year.

We would like to thank the Church Council for their discernment around this. They took this process very seriously, with the utmost concern for the congregation over their own personal views. Together, they carefully considered the results of the spectrum poll, which had more than 200 respondents and indicated that 94% strongly supported or mostly supported this decision. They also read the many comments you submitted with the spectrum poll and letters written in the last two years.

The Council decided to make this decision as a governing body because in today's political climate, it is often difficult to avoid the sense that these decisions involve "winners" and "losers." While the numbers of the poll were very clear, your comments and letters also reflected a diversity within our congregation:

- Some members felt we should have made this decision a decade ago.
- Some members support the Welcome Statement, but not the decision to become RIC.
- Some members strongly supported becoming RIC, but wished the Welcome Statement were worded differently.
- Some strongly felt that saying "all are welcome" should be sufficient, and that any naming of particular groups inherently leaves someone out.
- Some members have strongly held convictions about gender and sexuality that prevent them from supporting this decision.
- For some members, this decision is deeply personal and affects how they feel about inviting their own family members to this congregation.

One desire we heard again and again, across the spectrum, was that this be a decision that was good for the whole of the congregation and for the witness of St. John's in the larger community. It was for this reason that the Council felt that a faithful decision by this body -- that has met and discussed and listened over the course of the year -- was preferable to a single vote at a congregational meeting. The spectrum poll also allowed from us to hear from people who could not be physically present, including many of our homebound members.

As your pastors, we would like to thank you for participating in this process. You have been open and honest, and we have been grateful for the wide variety of ways we have talked – in forums, in small groups, in Bible studies, in one-on-one visits with shut-ins and home visits with concerned members. The church gives us ways to be in conversation that are more mutual and caring than a public debate, and for that we are grateful.

Yes! Thank you!

Almost everyone who takes Stephen Ministry training comments on how much of what they learn about Christian caregiving applies to their everyday life at home, at work, out in the world. As one long-time Stephen Minister put it, "This training has infiltrated every aspect of my life. Without it, I'd be a different person. I'd have different relationships with everyone, probably less healthy ones."

In a Stephen Ministry lesson called "Assertiveness: Relating Gently but Firmly," one of the skills emphasized is how to say no and how to say yes. Oddly enough, saying yes can be as complicated as saying no, and the two can get mixed up.

One of our SM's told a story that illustrates the problem: Her sister Nan, at the annual banquet of her company, had been given "The Most Valuable Supervisor" award. Afterwards Nan went up to her boss and said she couldn't accept it, she didn't deserve it, there were people who had been there much longer than she, who did their jobs better... Nan told her family about this in an e-mail filled with emotion. Her sister e-mailed back: "Congratulations! You've always given 150% to your job. I know you deserved that award. Now I want to suggest a different response from you, which comes out of my Stephen Ministry training: Why don't you try a simple 'Thank you!'? You have been given a gift, a high compliment, and it seems ungracious to refuse such a gift." The next day Nan e-mailed back: "I went into my boss's office and said, 'Thank you for that award. Your good opinion means a lot to me, and I'm honored.' I feel calmer about it now."

Here are possible responses to everyday situations that call for yes or no:

Yes: "Thank you for the compliment. This tie is special. My daughter gave it to me." Or: "Thank you. This is one of my favorite colors." Yes: I'd be happy to work at Friday's funeral; when would you like me to work?" Or: "She was a good friend of mine and I'd like to bring a cake as well as work at the funeral lunch." Or: "I'm free until twelve that day. Could you use me in the kitchen before noon?"

No: "I'm not free to work at Friday's funeral; but call me another time." (Notice: no elaborate excuses, no details of how busy you are, just a simple "No, I'm not free.") Or: "No, but could I bring a cake instead?" Or: "I won't be able to help out at funeral lunches any more. I say this with reluctance because I've enjoyed such work, but I've decided I need to pare down the activities in my life."

This month you might practice gentle but firm assertiveness. If someone gives you a compliment or a gift, receive it without deflecting it or minimizing yourself. If you are unable to do something that is asked of you, refrain from making excuses or explaining yourself, but instead kindly and firmly decline.

If you or anyone you know is going through a time of difficulty, call one of the pastors (507-645-4429) or Pam Schwandt (507-645-6120) to discuss the possibility of seeing a Stephen Minister. One of them will say **Yes!** when asked and listen to you attentively, without judging or advising.

Some of you opposed this decision have wondered if you are still welcome here. The answer is simple: yes. You are a crucial part of this congregation and we believe that Christ calls us together, not apart. Christ unites us and makes us the body of Christ.

What's next? St. John's will submit our Welcome Statement to Reconciling Works, so that we might be "on the map" of RIC congregations. Your Evangelism & Communications Board will discuss how to share the Welcome Statement and the RIC designation in our various communications. But most importantly, we will continue to be in conversation about how we extend Christ's welcome. This is not a destination, but a point along a journey of following Jesus into our changing world. Whatever your feelings about this outcome, we invite you to continue to be in prayerful conversation with us, which is how we are the body of Christ together.

Reconciling in Christ: Welcome Statement

St. John's Lutheran Church is a community grounded in the promise of God's grace, and called to extend Christ's welcome to all people. Every day, Christ meets us all just as we are, extending love to people of every age, race or ethnicity, physical appearance, sexual orientation, gender identity, physical or mental ability, marital or relationship status, economic circumstance, educational achievement, political affiliation, or religious background. While we do not always agree, we choose to walk and grow in faith together, believing that God creates diversity, and loves and welcomes us. We warmly welcome you here.

Results from the Congregational Survey and Council Vote on Becoming Reconciling in Christ (RIC)

A total of 221 surveys were filled out (a great turnout, comparable in number to both of the last congregational ballots on the call of our pastors).

94.1% of all surveys indicated support for becoming Reconciling in Christ and approving the Welcome Statement (88.2% or 195 surveys indicated they strongly agreed and 5.9% or 13 generally agreed). 1.4% of surveys (3) were neutral. 4.6% indicated some disagreement (1.4% or 3 surveys generally disagreed and 3.2% or 7 strongly disagreed).

Weighing these very strong results from the congregation along with all the information and comments gathered from the events held in 2016, the Council faithfully and without dissent voted at our meeting in January to proceed with becoming an RIC congregation and for approval of the Welcome Statement.


Visiting someone who is recovering from a surgery or cancer treatments?

My Last Challenge - - Be a Minister! By Mary Kelvie

I stepped into the role as Interim Shared Ministry Coordinator while Christy Hall-Holt was travelling for a semester abroad. It is hard to believe the last six months have gone by so quickly. Christy and her family are excited to be returning to Minne'snow'ta which means my time in this position at St. John's is drawing to a close. As I prepare to give the reigns back over to Christy, I have one last opportunity to write to you and give you one more challenge.

First, you need a little background information. When I was a teenager, the church we attended had a sign out front with the name of the church, the name of the pastor and one more line, "Ministers - ALL." I remember thinking, "What? What does 'Ministers - ALL' mean?" Then like a typical teenager with so many other "better" things to think about, I would promptly forget the sign...until the next time I saw it. One day as I was driving by the church and saw the sign, it dawned on me - "Ministers - ALL" means we (everyone - all the people of the church) are supposed to be ministers. Huh? How am I supposed to be a minister? I am not ordained, I am NOT going to seminary, after all I am still in high school.

Why would a church put up a sign saying, "Ministers - ALL"? What does the word minister mean? The definition most of us are familiar with is "a member of the clergy, especially in Protestant churches." However, minister can mean, "a person or thing used to achieve or convey something." As a verb, minister can also mean, "attend to the needs of (someone)."

My high school brain only thought of a minister being a member of the clergy, not about the fact we are all ministers. Isn't that what we are called to do as Christians - attend to the needs of others? Aren't we supposed to be showing others what it is to help, serve, and live outside ourselves in a "me-centered" world? Wasn't the person who put up the sign saying, "Ministers - ALL" right? Shouldn't we all be considered ministers? Now when I think of the sign in front of the church saying, "Ministers - ALL," I smile and think, "Thank you Lord, for the reminder to take a vacation from 'the world revolves around ME' and think of how I can help others and show them YOUR love."

As I step away from the Shared Ministry position, I want to thank you all for being ministers at St. John's. My challenge as I go is this...Keep it up! Keep helping and volunteering for Sunday Hospitality roles. Keep signing up to help at Wednesday Night Meals. Keep up the willingness to sing in the choirs, play bells, usher, serve communion, and step into the role of assisting minister on Sundays. Keep teaching Sunday School or being a leader at Wednesday night confirmation. Keep volunteering to help out in ways you feel called. Keep stretching yourselves to have conversations with new people. Keep giving those around you a welcoming smile. Keep it up St. John's after all we are "Ministers - ALL"!

Spots are available for a group registration and rate for Holden Village this summer. Families or individuals must make a first night's deposit by March 10th to hold a spot within the group.



Holden Village is a Lutheran retreat center in the Cascade mountains of Washington state. Originally a village for copper miners, it was gifted to the Lutheran church in

the 1960's and has been operating as a unique year-round ministry for the renewal of the church for over 50 years. Pastor Fickenscher serves on the board of the village, and many Lutherans have visited either on their own family retreats or as part of college student groups on J-term.

Our group will arrive in the village Sunday, July 23, and depart on Saturday, July 29.

Group rates for 2017 are:

A few guidelines:


- Clothing between 6–24 months. New is preferred, but can gently used is fine. No worn or stained clothing because it is increasingly difficult to get through customs in many countries and the entire shipment may be jeopardized.
- Soap, towels and diapers must be new.

No religious symbols, messages, patriotic or military symbols on clothing please.

Here's our donation schedule:

- Feb. 19: Lightweight cotton t-shirt (no Onesies) or 8-9 oz. gentle soap in original wrapping
- Feb. 26: Pair of baby socks or long or short-sleeved gown/sleeper without feet
- Mar. 5: Sturdy diaper pins or cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- Mar. 12: Jacket, sweater, or sweatshirt with a hood or include a baby cap
- Mar.19: Hand towel, dark color or receiving blanket in med-weight cotton or flannel up to 52" square


We ask the adult to pray for their buddy and to acknowledge them when they see their child in church. With this program,

Did God Kill Jesus? - A Lenten Book Read on *Making Sense of the Cross,* by David Lose.



The title of this article may sound a little harsh, but it is a question worth asking. What happened on the cross and the day Jesus died? What did God accomplish through the cross? Did God kill Jesus? Did Jesus have to die?

While many of us know the importance of the cross and resurrection of Christ to the Christian faith, many of us struggle to articulate why it matters or what it means.

In his book, Making Sense of the Cross, David Lose shows that the meaning of the cross has changed over the course of Christian history. To begin, Lose offers a thoughtful review of the four Gospels and how each portrays Jesus' death on the cross and what it might mean. He also walks the reader through three major ways that the cross has been understood over the past two thousand years, as long with the benefits and drawbacks of each. In the end, Lose hopes to offer an alternative view of the cross that is both biblical and faithful to the Christian life, which then can inform the way we live out the Christian faith in our daily lives.

Beginning on Sunday, February 26, small groups will meet to discuss *Making Sense of the Cross* for one hour a week, over a period of four weeks during Lent. Pub Theology in February

We are all theologians. Believe it or not, all of us are constantly doing theology as we think and wonder and ask big questions about God, Jesus, the Bible, and a life of faith.




Wednesday Night Book Discussion on Race in Minnesota

From Bread for the World

As the nation's 45th president, Donald Trump has an awesome responsibility to be the leader of all Americans.
